Carole Naggar



Born in Egypt to Jewish parents, Carole Naggar grew up in France and emigrated to New York in the late 80's. Her artwork is an ongoing dialogue between ancient and modern cultures and Eastern and Western traditions. As both a painter and a writer, Carole is particularly attracted to Eastern traditions where painting, calligraphy and poetry are not seen as separate arts, but are often combined on the same sheet or surface.

Her vast exploration of cultural identity and visual languages has resulted in a body of work that includes the appropriation of cave dwelling drawings from Southern France to Eighth Century Chinese ink paintings to the re-creation of metaphysical books, sacred texts and personal diaries burned in the Holocaust.

"As both a painter and a writer I look to find a bridge between Eastern and Western traditions and a balance between dry and wet materials (Sumi-e ink and pigment), gestural movements and inscriptions, control and chance."

She often combines the techniques, materials, and visual languages of different cultures – Middle Eastern, Western and Eastern – and pays homage to those cultures whose sacred texts, books, scrolls, wall paintings and other writings were destroyed by wars or other disasters.

Carol explores a mix of media – collage, ink and dry pigment, paint and photographic imagery, old manuscripts or books and found objects. Using both imported rice papers from Asia, as well as handmade papers she creates from cotton and abaca, Carol finds inspiration in the work of Tapies and Paul Klee, as well as in the ancient walls of Venice and Cairo, and memories of waking up in Fez, Morocco.
